
Kindeshaw Casa Masters Representative : He/Him

Prominent architects that have worked at OMA include Zaha Hadid, Bjarke Ingels, Winy Maas and Jacob van Rijs to name a few. OMA now span across the globe with firms based in Rotterdam, New York, Hong Kong, Doha, and Brisbane. OMA have strong ties with Perth, collaborating with Hassell on the awarding winning Boola Bardip museum and now working with. With Studios on the Perth Concert Hall upgrades. OMA see value in grassroots architecture, and as Western Australia's largest Architecture student organisation, CASA welcome their sponsorship and look forward to a collaborative future.

CASA's Collaborative Mission



(and probably will get me through thesis).



As students, by the time we get to Masters Urban Studio, we know that environments can affect our moods and our sense of place and sense of space. We know some environments connect us directly to deep personal moments of reflection, while others open us up to opportunities to heal. Yet on the other end of the spectrum, defensive architecture, workspaces with monotonous tone and visual stimulation can make us feel depressed, tired and unproductive.

In the book restorative Cities, we take a journey into how our urban centers can be a positive influence on our mental health, and well being. The book was published in 2021, fresh from the effects of Covid - 19 and moves through seven chapters that cover seven restorative concepts that together

form the Restorative City Framework. Each concept, Green, Blue, Sensory, Neighbourly, Active, Playable and Inclusive, dedicates its chapter to key definitions, the theory of its restorative properties and then backs it with both scientific data and case studies. The chapter takes you through design approaches with examples and then summarize the design principles for a Green, or Active, or inclusive city, covering both neighborhood scale and city scale.

The book is probably one of the best structured books I have read. It is very "pick up and play" where reading from start to finish is not necessary, and rather if your design wants to increase the activity levels for its inhabitants, you can just head to that chapter, get your links to journal articles, your case studies and your design principles. Of course certain principles are not always beneficial just in an urban landscape and can be adapted for interiors, and building design across all typologies. This book is an easy read, great for sources and explains concepts clearly and concisely.


